Headlice

At any one point in time, there will always be a small group of children, in any school, that have headlice. They are commonplace in younger children, but anyone can get them. Headlice are found worldwide, have been around for thousands of years and are virtually unpreventable. They are nothing to be ashamed of and parents should not be looking to apportion blame if and when they are detected. Head lice are a nuisance; however, they do not spread disease and are not an indication of personal hygiene or cleanliness.

Whilst cleanliness is not related to contracting head lice, regular combing through after hair washing does allow for early detection and easy eradication. This is a non-chemical approach and is referred to as 'bug busting'. It involves the removal of lice from the hair after the hair has been washed and conditioned. With the conditioner still in, the hair is combed gradually using a fine-tooth comb, section by section, in order to remove the lice.
